Physical inactivity is a key risk factor for non-communicable diseases, and the fourth leading cause of early death globally. Physical inactivity has reached alarming levels in the Eastern Mediterranean Region, which has the second highest level of physically inactive populations among Who regions and the highest level for women. Recent estimates show that approximately 31% of the world's population does not undertake the recommended amount of Physical activity to to protect their health. In the region, available data form 8 countries show levels of inactivity range from about 30% to as high as 70%. Of concern is that less than half of the countries of the region have systematic monitoring of levels of Physical activities in adults and children, and very few countries have commenced any comprehensive action aimed at increasing levels of activity, through sports, recreation, cycling, and walking. In 2011, the UN political Declaration on Prevention and Control of Non-communicable Diseases, agreed by all the member states, renewed the call on member states to take actions to reduce physical inactivity. Although the need to implement was one of the key issues in 2012, at the world health assembly in may 2013, it was endorsed by member states to reach the target of a 10% reduction in Physical inactivity by 2025. The "global recommendations on Physical activity for Health" address three age groups of 5-17 years old, 18-64 years old, and 65 years old and above, stressing that physical activity is fundamental in achieving energy balance and weight control. Physical activity reduces the risk of heart diseases by 30%, diabetes by 27%, and breast cancer by 21%-25%.

Recurrent headaches characterized as migraine are among the most common disorders of the nervous system which can cause severe throbbing pain or a pulsing sensation. They are often accompanied by nausea, vomiting, and extreme sensitivity to light and sound .People who suffer from migraines can recognize that different triggers may get a headache started. Many migraine sufferers say hot weather and low barometric pressure can act as triggers. A study conducted in 2015 has attempted to compare weather conditions twenty four hours before hospital visits. for every increase of 5°C, the patients had a 7.4% a higher risk of migraine .

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The study has also found that age, gender, and where a person has extra body fat may affect the risk of migraine. Whereas older people tend to suffer from migraine less frequently than the youth. Overweight people between the ages of twenty and thirty-five may have a higher risk. On average, those who were larger around the middle were more likely to have migraines than those of the same age with smaller waistlines

Neurologists believe they have identified a hypersensitive nerve system that prompts the pain; they are in the final stages of testing medicines that soothe its overly active cells, These are the first drugs ever specifically designed to prevent the crippling headaches before they star. While existing data will be helpful, new data will be available through technologies like sensors which should improve predictions. Al techniques, such as machine learning, can be leveraged to provide clinical risk prediction to improve patient safety.

Drug addiction is a brain disorder involving a compulsive use of drugs in spite of its detrimental consequences Biologically, although drug use leads to unfavorable results, the drug addict's brain functions to reward drug-taking. In addition to that, at the psychological level, the drug addict becomes enslaved and loses control over the addictive behavior. Biologically, the normal function and chemistry of our brain encourage the individual to repeat behaviors that are enjoyable such as sleeping and eating. Inconsistent, non-functional water supply and underused deteriorating toilets undermine significant progress toward achieving universal access to safe water and sanitation. The United Nations (UN) estimates that at least 29% of the global population relies on some level of fecal or chemically contaminated or unimproved water source for drinking. Two billion people do not use sanitation facilities coupled with safe excreta disposal and treatment services, also. 3 billion people lack handwashing facilities with available soap and water. Despite the strong biological plausibility that improving WASH conditions is a basic strategy for yielding gains in health. several rigorous, high-profile field trials reveal minimal or no reductions in childhood diarrheal disease or undernutrition from WASH interventions typically delivered to rural populations in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs). The evidence for health impact from WASH service delivery in urban areas in LMICs is also limited. The failure to sustain services and reliably quantify health gains in the sector is perhaps rooted the complexity of innovation and implementation strategy requirements, limited external validity, diverse objectives, and the multiple service providers and multilevel nature of WASII interventions.
